

**DEATH OF JOHN P. HARLOW.**

**DIED.**—At the Crawford Hotel, in Grand Junction, on Thursday morning, March 12th 1891, of pneumonia. Aged 61 years.

In the death of "Judge" Harlow, as he was familiarly known, Western Colorado loses one of its early pioneers. He was a native of Canada, and the greater portion of his life has been spent upon the frontiers of the great West. He came to Grand Junction from Gunnison, among the first pioneers in 1881 and located a ranch in the upper valley, and was among the first to test the productiveness of the soil. He was intimately connected with the early history of the townsite location, as the first justice of the peace. He was also Deputy United States Marshall for some time. In 1883 he located a ranch at the mouth of Rapid creek eighteen miles East of Grand Junction, in a well sheltered spot. His death was not anticipated, all though it was known that he was very sick. He leaves a wife and we understand, several children by a former marriage. Mrs. Harlow has the sympathies of a large circle of friends in her bereavement.

After a short funeral service at the Rink by Rev. Dickenson, the body was taken to his home on Rapid creek and was interred on Friday.
