into the cellar and set him to peeling potatoes, and then went up town. In a few
minutes he was sent for, the messenger saying that the stranger had cut his throat.

On investigation it appeared that the man
had peeled but one potatoe, and that he then
used the potatoe knife to cut his throat. He
made a fearful gash almost from ear to ear
severing both the larynx and the left carotid
artery. He had died immediately after
making the terrible cut.

rooms of M. O. Whitehead. Upon examination there was found upon his person a rail
road ticket to Bound Brook, N.J., a baggage
check from SanFrancisco to the same point, a
