

We have not yet devised a good way to share information. Every tree climber has at least three 3-ring notebooks, half-a-dozen spirals before he or she knew better, a few boxes of clip-jot-and-file and 14 piles that we dare anyone to touch. Our prayer known to all genealogists is "Please don't let me have company until I

can get those piles put away!"

One of those piles consists of unanswered correspondence and another is quarterlies or publications that you haven't had time to finish, or there is an article in one of them that you want to copy. Among these collections so precious to one are often clues valuable to another. If we can just devise ways to make some of this information available to others we will perhaps help spread the branches of someone else's family tree.

Surname cards are an excellent way to share information. File them with your genealogical societies and request searches for your names. Let others know who you are looking for and in what locations. Offer your quarterlies or other publi-

cations to genealogists for research, in their home or yours.

If you have suggestions on how to better share information, bring them to our monthly workshop meetings or discuss it with one of our Board Members. We are always looking for better ways.

The society will conduct a genealogy workshop on each 3rd Thursday at the Public Library from 2 to 4 P.M. It is designed to help anyone doing family research and is not limited to members. One particular subject will be emphasized each meeting, but the discussions will not be limited to one issue. The subject for the Feb. 21st meeting is "Research With Newspapers". Bring your records and join the group.

From the Federation of Genealogical Societies and the Decatur Genealogical Society (Illinois) we learn that the Balch Institute for Ethnic Studies, 18 South Seventh Street, Philadelphia, PA, 19106, houses the Temple University National Immigration Archives. They consist of ship manifests from all Eastern United States ports from 1820 to 1914 and contain the names of 35,000,000 people who immigrated to the United States during this period.

The manifests were turned over to Temple University by the National Archives in Washington for the purpose of indexing them on computer. When the Project is well under way the Balch Institute, in cooperation with Temple University, will make available to genealogical researchers computer printouts concerning arrivals

to the United States.

LAWS AND FEES TO THE

Kansas is now charging \$6.00 for birth and death certificates. Also the state law says access to Vital Statistics is restricted to people who need the records to determine personal or property rights. It does not permit disclosure of information for purposes of genealogical research. The State Historical Society needs your help in persuading legislators to open these records for research. MESA COUNTY HAS PIONEER SOCIETY IN 1885

Mesa County settlers founded a Pioneer Society when it was only 3½ years old, probably earlier in a county history than any in the USA. The county was opened for settlement in September 1881 and on 15 April, 1885 the first meeting to organize was held at the courthouse. J. Armitage Hall was elected chairman and J. Clayton Nichols secretary. The following statement was prepared and adopted:

"We the undersigned, settled in this County in the latter part of 1881 and the beginning of 1882, and are desirous of forming a Pioneer and Historical Society for the purpose of perpetuating good fellowship, and for the further purpose of keeping a correct record of events that transpired during the early history of our beautiful valley."

SOCIETY JOINS NEW COUNCIL FOR WESTERN COLORADO HERITAGE

The Museum of Western Colorado has created a Council of Western Colorado Heritage in order that organization with related goals can meet on a regular basis and discuss their current and proposed projects. Membership is offered to "local organizations engaged in the collection, preservation, interpretation and dissemination of this region's social and natural history."

Eight organizations were recognized at the January meeting as members of the new Council: Audubon Society, Colorado Archeological Society - Quahada Chapter, D.A.R. - Mt. Garfield Chapter, Mesa County Genealogical Society, Mesa County Historical Society, Museum of Western Colorado, National Railroad Historical Society - Rio Grande Chapter, and Territorial Daughters.

The Society Board of Directors has selected its serving president to act as the voting member in the Council and Phyllis George to serve as alternate. Anyone interested in attending regular meetings is welcome, but only the designated representaive will vote. Meetings are scheduled for the last Thursdays of each month at 7 P.M. at the Museum.

ਹੁੰਦੂ ਜੋ THE BLUE LAWS - IS IT ANY WONDER? ਜੁਜ਼ਦੂਰ

Attempts to establish trade colonies along our New England coast had never succeeded, but the religious zealots from Great Britain and central Europe were successful in founding settlements with God's word as their guiding strength, counsel and source of power. Perhaps their belief that they would find the right answers from God took the responsibilities out of the hands of "mere" man and they could in majority accept answers found written in what they accepted as God's laws.

Such a group founded New Haven, Connecticut in the spring of 1638. Under the leadership of Rev. John Davenport. and Theophilus Eaton, a successful merchant, they had left a Massachusetts Company settlement and were now a group with no ties to England, responsibility to no governing body, reliant upon the strength of the men they followed and with memories of past experiences still strong th their minds. These conditions made possible the strictest Puritan Colony of them all.

In June, 1639 the free planters assembled to set up a civil government "according to God" and to nominate the fittest persons for the foundation of a Church. It was agreed that (1) "the Scriptures hold forth a perfect rule for the direction and government of all men in all duties to God and men . . . (2) a plantation covenant was agreed upon that "matters that concern civil order, choice of magistrates and officers, making and repealing laws, diviving allotments of inheritances, etc., would be ordered by those rules which the scripture holds forth to us.", (3) those who desired to be received as free planters and are settled in the plantation were asked to make known if they desired to be admitted into Church fellowship, (4) free planters were asked whether they felt bound to establish civil order according to God, (5) that town Burgesses be chosen from Church members (one dissenting voice), and (6) at least 12 men would be chosen and among them they would choose the 7 fittest to begin the Church. THIS AGREEMENT WAS SIGNED BY 111 PERSONS.

Out of this meeting the Fundamental Orders were adopted, and some claim them to be the first written constitution. They lasted two decades.

The seven chosen to found the first Church were John Daven port, Theophilus Eaton, Robert Newman, Mathew Gilbert, Thomas Fugill, John Ponderson and Jeremy Dixon. They became known in Connecticut history as the Seven Pillars. Because he held the commission in the Massachusetts Company to govern new settlements and was the only lawyer in the Colony it is likely that Roger Ludlow had much to do with the writing of the Fundamental Orders with the influence of The Seven Pillars.

Is it any wonder that we find such laws as the following after 1639? Listed below are a few of the Blue Laws they lived by.

- The Governor and magistrates convened in general assembly on the surpeme power und God of this independent dominion.
- 5) The assembly of the people shall not be dismissed by the governor but shall dismiss itself.

Conspiracy against this dominion shall be punished with death.

- 7) Whosoever says there is a power and jurisdiction above and over this dominion shall suffer death and loss of property.
- 11) Each free man shall swear by the Blessed God to bear true allegiance to this dominion and that Jesus is the only King.

No food or lodging shall be offered to a Quaker, Adamite, or other Heretic.

- 14) If any person turns Quaker, he shall be banished and not suffered to return, but on pain of death.
- 15) No "Priest" shall abide in the dominion. He shall be banished and shall suffer death on his return.

17) No one to cross a river, but with an authorized ferryman.

- 18) No one shall run on the sabbath day or walk in his garden except reverendly to and from meeting.
- 19) No one shall travel, cook vittles, make beds, sweep house, cut hair or shave on the sabbath day.

20) No woman shall kiss her child on the sabbath or fasting day.

21) The Sabbath shall begin at sunset on Saturday.

26) A drunkard shall have a master appointed by the Selectmen who are to debar him from the liberty of buying and selling.

27) Whosoever publishes a lie to prejudice of his neighbor shall be set in the stocks or be whipped ten stripes.

31) Whosoever wears clothes trimmed with gold, silver, or dun lace above 2s per yard shall be presented by the grand jurors and the Selectman shall tax the offender at #300L estate.

- 34) Whoever brings cards or dice into this dominion shall pay a fine of 5 Lbs. 35) No one shall read common prayer books, keep Christmas or set days, make mince pies, dance, play cards, or play on any instrument of music except the drum, trumpet and Jews Harp.
- 38) The selectman, on finding children ignorant may take them away from their parents and put them into better hands at the expense of their parents.

40) Adultry shall be punished with death.

41) A man that strikes his wife shall pay a fine of ten pounds.

45) Married persons must live together or be imprisioned.

46) Every male shall have his hair cut round according to a cap.

Extracted from the Ancient Records of New Haven 1643:

Andrew Low, jun. for breaking into Mr. Ling's house, where he brake open a cupboard and took from thence some Strong Water and 6d. in mondey, and ransackt the house from roome to roome, and left open the the doors, for which fact being committed to prison brake forth and escaped, and still remains horrible obstinate and rebellious against his parents. It was ordered that he shall be severly whipt and work with his father with a lock upon his leg so that he may not escape.

### ARTICLE I - NAME AND PURPOSE
