



GENEALOGICAL RESEARCH IN NEWSPAPERS

From our first days in America we have felt a "near" obsession for newspapers. Today, despite the presence of radio and television in almost every home, we still wait for delivery of the daily newspaper and complain loudly if it is late or does not arrive.

The earliest newspapers in the colonies arrived from London beginning in 1621. By 1691 we had our own American newspaper published in Boston with the catchy name "Public Occurences Both Foreign and Domestic". Newspapers were the settlers link to the outside world, but today these early publications are our link to the past and provide us with a good

description of the community in its time.

Between 1690 and 1820 there were 2,120 different newspapers published in the United States, but half of them existed only two years or less. No issues of 194 of these early starters have been located. The longest lasting was the Pennsylvania Gazette which published for 87 years, 1728 - 1815. After 1830 there was a twenty year period of waning interest in newspapers. It has been suggested that during those twenty years we were experiencing a time of relative national calm. By 1850 slavery was becoming a strong issue and newspapers again became important as a sorce of information and opinion.

Newspapers can provide much more genealogical information than that found in the traditional obituary, nor are clues always found in the headlines. They may be in the ads where the proprietors names are given, indicating a profession or occupation. In the Public Notices of court judgements, lists of names were given of defendants, plaintiffs, judges, county recorders, lists of grand jurors were published and the proceedings of probate actions. School graduates at the end of school terms, school board members, changes among ministers to the churches and member lists of organizations as they conducted their activities were published. Post Masters published lists of unclaimed letters held in their offices, which might indicate that someone had moved. Private life clues came to light when husbands advertised that they would not be responsible for debts incurred by a wife who had eloped. Runaway slaves, apprentices and indentured servants were advertised in the newspapers

A guide for newspapers can be found for almost every state. An example is <u>Guide to Ohio Newspapers 1793-1973</u>: <u>A Union Bibliography of Ohio Newspapers Available in Ohio Libraries</u> by Stephen Gutgesell. Its index contains specialized categories for foreign language newspapers, black journals, religious publications and others. Another example, <u>Pennsylvania Newspapers and Selected Out-of State Newspapers</u>, prepared by the General Library Bureau, State Library of Pennsylvania, lists those on microfilm at the Pennsylvania State Archives and the Pennsylvania State Library. The "American Weekly Mercury" of 1719 is the earliest paper and there are a few out-of-state and foreign newspapers included.

The availability of newspapers on microfilm can make your research a project to do in your own locality though many are not available for loan. Newspapers on Microfilm, compiled by George A. Schwegmann, Jr. (6th ed., Washington, Library of Congress, 1967) has listings arranged by state and city for the United States, province and city of Canada and French West Indies, and by cities for other countries. (If it is not available in your library, try ordering it through inter-library loan.)

If no newspaper was published in your town, a nearby town may have been the news center for that area. Do your homework as completely as possible before going to your librarian for help. If you can locate a newspaper in your research area, then ask about inter-library loan.

Locally, a search at the LDS Genealogical Branch Library might make a newspaper research available to you on microfilm or give you a list of sources to search on a trip to the Genealogical Library in Salt Lake City. Ask to search the DCC file. Information contained in this card catalog covers all of the United States and most countries, with the information in the specific area listed if it is available in the Salt Lake Library. You will find newspapers in some areas. An example is a Pagosa Springs, Colorado newspaper, 1892 - 1931.

Sources to ask for at the Mesa County Public Library are The IMS Ayer Directory of Publications, New York Times Obituary Index 1858 - 1968, Guide to Colorado Newspapers 1859 - 1963, Guide to

Microforms in Supplement Print 1981, and The Source.

RELATED TO A PRESIDENT?

Were your ancestors among the settlers who arrived in America between 1620 and 1675?

Gary Boyd Roberts, director of research at New England Historic Genealogical Society (founded in 1843) was quoted in Forbes Magazine, October 1984, as saying "Roughly 100 million Americans are descended from 25,000 people that settled New England between 1620 and 1650. Another 50 million came from settlers of the mid-Atlantic States and Virginia that were mostly settled some 25 years later. Almost all these people have at least one U. S. President as an eight or ninth cousin".

Your answer to the question may be in Burke's Presidential Families of the United States of America, 2nd Edition. In the index you will find the names AMES, BAILEY, HALL, HARMON, DUNBAR, MARSHALL, SCHAEFER, WHITEHEAD, ZUBER and hundreds more. It is on a shelf at the Public Library.
