

## Websites of Interest

The following internet sites may be helpful when you are trying to define living persons in your family tree. [www.zabasearch.com](http://www.zabasearch.com) and [www.lookupanyone.com](http://www.lookupanyone.com), can be used to define the address and telephone number of currently living (or recently deceased individuals. Simply enter the surname and given name, and, if you know it, the state of residence. A number of possibilities will typically be given as "hits". In addition to the addresses and telephone number, a rough age will also sometimes be provided. If you click on the box for more information, you will be directed to Intelius.com which will provide some further information in the way of possible family members and sometimes their current age, as well as a summary of residence history. This will be provided as part of an advertisement for a complete background check, but you do not have to pay anything for the service up to this point. You can also go [birthdatabase.com](http://birthdatabase.com) to obtain an exact birth date for an individual. If the name is a common one, you're going to get lots of "hits" for a number of people in the United States with that name, but the good news is that it will also give you their current city and state. The latter is helpful in sorting out which individual you are seeking.

Sometimes you have the name of an individual but wish to determine the given name of their spouse. Once you have the exact address from Zabasearch or Lookupanyone, you can run a "reverse address" check. One site for doing this is International Infobel.com. Their URL is [www.usinfo.com/en/usa](http://www.usinfo.com/en/usa). Simply plug in the address and it will tell you who occupies that address. Many times that will be in the format of "John and Mary Doe". If you only had John Doe, now you have his wife's given name as well.

Another site that is useful has to do with obituaries. Obits are very valuable sources of genealogical information, often giving the name of both predeceased and surviving spouses, parents, and children, sometimes even grandchildren. Try [www.obitz.us](http://www.obitz.us). This is not a very complete database, but the good news on this one is that you can do a general surname search and you will get all of the individuals in the database with that surname. Great for surname studies, but will also occasionally yield up someone who is related.

All of these sites are somewhat "hit and miss". What genealogical source isn't? But in working the clues provided by all of these sites together we can sometimes piece together the desired information. As always, show respect for privacy and those who may not share your enthusiasm for genealogical research.

Carl was born May 14, 1881 in Quincy, Illinois, Adams County.

Carl's father's name was John Baker, his mother's name was, Margaret Miller Baker. Ron has no further information on them. Family lore has it that he ran away from home in the late 1890's or early 1900's. Family lore also said Carl occasionally mentioned a sister and often talked fondly about a younger brother named Fred (Frederick). Ron's first record of Carl is in Colorado in 1902 working for the railroad in McCoy, Colorado.
